2017 School Counselor Corps Grant RFP Now Available

The 2017-18 School Counselor Corps Grant Request for Proposal (RFP) is now available for local education agencies to apply for funding and increase the availability and implementation of effective school-based counseling within secondary schools. This RFP is being released but is contingent upon enacting pending additional appropriations to the School Counselor Corps program.

The anticipated level of funding available is about \$500,000, for approximately 15 grant awards. Within the first year of the four-year grant cycle individual awards will range between \$25,000 and \$50,000. The first year of the grant will focus on program development, needs assessment and direct services. In the second, third, and fourth years of the grant, successful grantees will receive up to \$80,000 per funded school.

Applications are due **Tuesday**, **March 7**.
